**Professor Johanna Westbrook**, *Director of the Centre for Health Systems and Safety Research, Australian Institute of Health Innovation, Macquarie University*



Johanna is internationally recognised for her research evaluating the effects of information and communication technology (ICT) in health care. Her research has led to significant advances in our understanding of how clinical information systems deliver (or fail to deliver) expected benefits and supported translation of this evidence into policy, practice, and IT system changes. Johanna is a Fellow of the American College of Medical Informatics (ACMI). In 2016 she was appointed to the Board of the Australian Digital Health Agency.

**Professor Ian Frazer**, *Chief Executive and Director, Translation Research Institute, UQ*




Ian Frazer is a clinician scientist. He is recognised as co-inventor of the technology enabling the HPV vaccines, currently used worldwide to help prevent cervical cancer. He is current president of the Australian Academy of Health and Medical Sciences, and a member of the Commonwealth Science Council. Most recently appointed chair of the federal governments Medical Research Future Fund. He was recognised as Australian of the Year in 2006.

**Honourable Nicola Roxon**, *Chair HESTA*



A well-respected and former politician, Nicola was a member of the Australian Parliament for 15 years (1998-2013). She served as Australia's Health Minister for four years from 2007 and oversaw major reforms to Australia's public hospital, primary care and preventative health systems. In 2011 she became Australia's first female Attorney-General. Nicola has received national and international awards in recognition of her public health work, particularly in tobacco control. Under her leadership, Australia successfully introduced a world first - plain packaging of tobacco with large, graphic health warnings. This helped reduce cigarette consumption and its associated health impacts.

**Romlie Mokak**, *Commissioner, Productivity Commission*



Romlie is a Djugun man and a member of the Yawuru people. Romlie was previously Chief Executive of the Lowitja Institute, Australia's national institute for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health research, and the Chief Executive of the Australian Indigenous Doctors' Association for almost a decade. Earlier roles included Director, Substance Use, and Manager of the National Eye Health Program, for the Australian Government's Office for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health. He was the first Aboriginal policy officer in the NSW government Ageing and Disability Department.
