A framework to support the development of effective health policy will assist governments to respond to these challenges.

Health policy, and all reforms, must:

- Focus on, and be responsive to, patient needs and health outcomes
- Simplify the patient journey
- See health as an investment, not just as a cost
- Be developed in consultation with service providers, professions and the community, taking into account impacts across the continuum of care
- Be sustainable and sustained, reducing inefficiency and waste, and providing value for money
- Be evidence-based and data informed
- ★ Incorporate structured, timely and transparent evaluation
- Support accountability and transparency
- Support prevention and early intervention
- * Support equity
- Recognise and accommodate cultural diversity
- ★ Include change management strategies and associated incentives
- ❖ Incorporate the contributions of the primary, community and acute health care sectors, the education and training sector and the public, private and notfor profit sectors
